




**Common Ash** 25 m. Compound leaves open late. Keys stay on in winter. Common in woods and parks.




**Black Poplar** 25 m. Dark trunk often with bumps. Common in city parks.



**Common Lime** 25 m. Heart-shaped leaves. Fragrant flowers attract bees in June. Parks and gardens.




**Rowan or Mountain Ash** 7 m. Compound leaves. Flowers May. Sour orange berries September. Wild on mountains.



**Hornbeam** 10 m. Smooth, grey, fluted trunk. Green winged fruits hanging in clusters. Hedges.



**Silver Birch** 15 m. White bark peels in ribbons. 'Lamb's tail' catkins in April. Wild on heaths and mountains. Planted in gardens.




**White Poplar** 20 m. Leaves covered with white down underneath. Bark whitish-grey with diamond marks.




**Turkey Oak** 25 m. Whiskers on buds and at base of leaves. Acorn cups mossy. Bark ridged.




**Yew** 15 m. Dark green. Trunk gnarled. Bark reddish. Leaves and red-berried fruits poisonous.




**Japanese Cherry** 9 m. Flowers April May. Many varieties. Gardens and along streets.



**Weeping Willow** 20 m. Drooping shape. Near water and in gardens.



**English or Pedunculate Oak** 23 m. Wide-spreading branches. Long-stalked acorns. Common alone and in woods.



**London Plane** 30 m. Bark flakes off leaving white patches. Spiky fruits stay on in winter. City streets.



**False Acacia or Locust Tree** 20 m. Compound leaves. Ridged twigs spiny. Hanging flowers in June. Gardens, parks.


# Brockwell Park Tree Trail

There are lots of different trees in the park, can you find 25? Some are easy, some more difficult.


When you find a tree draw a line from the tree on this sheet to where you saw it on the map and tick the box. You can add more species if you like by writing their names on the map.




**Horse Chestnut** 25 m. Compound leaves. Upright flowers May. Prickly fruits with 'conkers' inside.




**Holly** 10 m. Evergreen. Leaves often variegated. Berries poisonous. Often shrub-like.




**Holm Oak** 20 m. Evergreen. Shiny leaves resemble Holly. Grey bark. Parks and gardens.



**Common Beech** 25 m. Smooth, grey bark. Nuts eaten by animals. Leaves can also be purple-coloured.



**Whitebeam** 8 m. Leaves white-leaved underneath. Flowers May June. Sour red berries. Grows wild.



**Common Alder** 12 m. Cone-like fruits which stay on in winter. Catkins in early spring. Near water and damp woodlands.
